From Father Mark

Christmas Masses—As I mentioned at the Masses last weekend at which I presided, Fr. Tom and I, with the help and guidance of many of you, will have to make some decisions regarding when and where Christmas Masses will take place. The biggest problem will be accommodating everyone that might want to come and at the same time being safe around each other. The capacity of our churches has been temporarily reduced in a significant way so that all who attend may remain at a 6' distance throughout the most of the Mass.

Some of the options for our Mass schedule include: starting earlier (the Bishop is considering moving up the approved start time for Christmas Mass), having more Masses (Fr. Tom and I are willing to celebrate more Masses for Christmas), having a Sign-up/Reservation system for the Christmas Masses, setting up the social halls at both places as overflow seating with the Mass livestreamed to those halls, having Mass at the St. Peter School gym as it would hold more people and would allow us to distance, or some other idea(s) that have not yet occurred to me or the Liturgy committee at St. Peter's. I know none of these options is wonderful (I am not wild about them either) but I am not willing to let the church fill up to normal capacity, so something has to be done. Please think about these and any other options and then pray about what you think would be best for all of us. It will be very easy to just consider what 'I' want, but if we are to be a real family of faith, we will need to consider what is best for all.

Therefore, I need all of you to consider what you think would work best. Ministers will be needed for the Masses and if we decide to increase the number of Masses, some of us will have to be generous enough to minister at more than one Mass this Christmas. Please let Fr. Tom, Mr. Ron Sayer, any member of the St. Peter Liturgy commission, or myself know your ideas. I thank those of you that have already shared your thoughts (or two cents as someone put in their email to me). Fr. Tom and I are committed to making some decision by the 1st of December so that we can get the word out to everyone (website, signs on the property, ads in the paper, etc). Thank you for any consideration you can give to our dilemma.

A Path Forward—This coming Wednesday, representatives from the 3 Catholic communities in Saline County will meet (via Zoom) to discuss how the pastoral needs of the people of Saline county could be met with fewer priests. Currently Saline county is served by approximately 2.25 priests. Most people do not like changes to routine, especially spiritual routines, thus no one really likes any of the options surfaced so far (fewer Mass times, fewer Mass places, reorganizing administrative structures). People naturally want to keep doing what they feel they have always done (in seminary we learned that 'forever' in a parish is basically 40 years). Yet, this is not an option given the number of priests that are going to be available in the near future. The Bishop has set up this procedure to get input and to help us be a part of the process. 'Leave us alone' is simply not an option. Other parts of the diocese have already undergone some restructuring and now it is our turn, basically. The Bishop will be working with other parishes in a similar fashion next year (thus it is not just us that will have to change).

Thus, if you have any ideas, please share them with any member of the parish council, Fr. Tom, or myself. The Bishop has committed himself to having a plan in place by the end of the year so that the Priests' Personnel Board can make appropriate suggestions for staffing our communities here in Saline county and throughout the diocese.

Mulch—There is another mound of wood chips/mulch in the northwest corner of the St. Peter's parking lot. I am grateful to the Rubio's for providing it from one of their recent tree removal projects. Anyone is welcome to spread it around our trees—either by oneself or with a group (appropriate hygiene and distancing protocol's please!). The information I have from an arborist is that the mulch can/should be about 3" thick and extend out 3' from the trunk. Thank you again to all that have already helped. Your efforts will help our trees be even more healthy and will make it easier for the Holy Mowers to do there ministry. We have 7 ash trees (green ones I think) and no matter what we do, we will probably loose them in the next few years. At least 3 of them are afflicted with Ash Yellows (a disease I don't know much about) and all of them will most likely succumb to the Emerald Ash Borer when it gets here. Sad, yes, but it will give us the opportunity to plant some new trees of different varieties around the property.

Thank you—I have been trying again to go through the letters and cards many of you sent me on the occasion of my father's death. Your touching words, thoughts, and acts have truly moved me. I discovered that I have not thanked some of you that shared monetary gifts for a memorial for my father or for Masses to be said. I sincerely apologize. I will rectify the situation by the end of the week, if I haven't accomplished the task already. The monies will be deposited in the appropriate parish accounts forthwith. Peace,

It is good to be back with you again. My thoughts are drawn to the readings of the 33rd Sunday of Ordinary time. Sometimes, it is difficult to express what we feel. That, however, is what we are called to do. Scripture reminds us that, “When one finds a worthy wife, her value is far beyond pearls. Her husband, entrusting his heart to her, has an unfailing prize. She brings him good, and not evil, all the days of her life. . . She obtains wool and flax and works with loving hands. She puts her hands to the distaff, and her fingers ply the spindle. She reaches out her hands to the poor, and extends her arms to the needy.”

It is good to be appreciative of those around us. Also, it is good to reach out to the poor and needy. We are asked to use our talents.

You may see the signs marked PRAY and ORAR in yards around town. I try to invite our school children to have a thankful heart.

Thanksgiving is a good stepping stone to our prayer to God. While the holiday of Thanksgiving is something to celebrate, many are scaling back gatherings out of caution. The challenge is to be thankful to God and others perhaps in a different way—perhaps with a phone call or a Zoom meeting or a Skype call. There will be a Mass Thanksgiving day Nov. 26th at 9AM here at St. Peters. At this time, I am not sure whether it will be live-streamed on Facebook or not.

Enjoy these gospel stories brought to life in a special way. Children, teens, adults, ALL will enjoy.



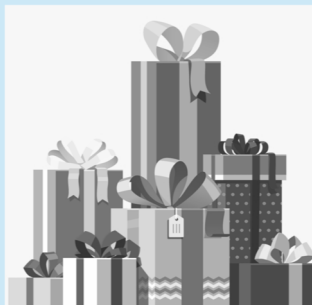

SAN ALBERTO MAGNO (1206-1280)

15 de noviembre

El primer amor de Alberto fueron las ciencias, pues mediante ellas descubrió y defendió la grandeza de Dios. Aunque amó las ciencias, más amó la teología. A los 16 años se trasladó a la Universidad de Padua, donde conoció a los dominicos, congregación a la cual se uniría para servir como maestro en Alemania a los 22 años y a los 23 vestir el hábito dominico, pese a la negativa de su padre. Su influencia en el pensamiento cristiano se dio gracias a que inició el diálogo de la fe con las ciencias. Entre sus discípulos tuvo al teólogo de todos los tiempos, Tomás de Aquino, quien sentaría las bases para la teología perenne. A los 48 años fue nombrado Provincial de Alemania, pero renunció para seguir enseñando y estudiando. Después, fue consagrado obispo de Ratisbona, cargo que ejerció durante dos años como un pastor caminante, sencillo y pobre. Fue un gran maestro al que se le dio el título de Magno debido a la amplitud, calidad y profundidad de sus escritos y pensamiento teológico.

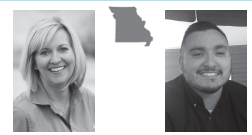
